






When you meet Cary W., you quickly realize you're in the presence of a fighter — someone who has spent a lifetime turning obstacles into victories. Born with severe bone deformities, Cary spent much of his childhood in treatment. At age nine, an orthopedic specialist placed him in heavy leg braces and confined him to bed for a year. Instead of giving in to frustration, Cary found escape in books — his first glimpse of the determination that would carry him through life.

When he could finally stand and walk again, his family expected he'd attend a school for children with special needs. But administrators who met him saw something else — a bright, curious boy who belonged in a mainstream classroom. They urged his parents to enroll him at Gage Middle School, where he thrived academically.

"I had no idea I was disabled until I got there," he says. "At first that was hard. But I decided that if I worked hard enough, I could do anything."

And he did. Cary graduated with honors and became the first in his family to attend UCLA. His father was so proud he ran door-to-door down their block showing the acceptance letter to every neighbor.



Cary went on to a successful career in IT, traveling the world and even helping program computers for Team USA at the Athens Olympics. Then another



challenge appeared: glaucoma, a disease that eventually stole his sight.

Once again, Cary chose resilience over despair. "I decided I could still make a difference," he says. Today he volunteers at the Braille Institute, helping others adjust to life without sight and



showing them that purpose doesn't disappear in darkness.

That same light shines in the way Cary talks about St. Vincent Meals on Wheels. "I can't believe how much they care," he says. "From the

drivers who bring my meals with kindness to the social workers who make sure my home is safe — they go above and beyond."

Through our Home Sweet Home program, social worker Fiona arranged grab bars, motion lights, and a

sturdy walker so Cary can move confidently around his apartment — small changes that have made a big difference in his independence.

Like Cary, St. Vincent Meals on Wheels meets every challenge with courage and hope. Through fires, pandemics, and funding cuts, we've continued to serve our community with the same steadfast spirit — finding light in hardship and strength in love.

Cary's story reminds us that perseverance is at the heart of who we are. His determination reflects our mission: to move forward together, one meal, one visit, and one act of care at a time.

A CIRCLE OF CARE, ROOTED IN GRATITUDE

At St. Vincent Meals on Wheels, every act of giving helps ensure that homebound seniors are cared for and never forgotten. Longtime Circle of Angels donors Michelle and Charlie Kirkpatrick embody that spirit. For them, giving is not charity but a shared responsibility — a way to care for our clients with dignity, love, and faith in action.

Married for 29 years, the Kirkpatricks have two daughters who were raised with a strong sense of purpose. Charlie has spent his career helping healthcare organizations improve outcomes, while Michelle has worked in healthcare and accounting, dedicating many years to raising

their girls.

"We've been blessed in life," Charlie says. "I've always felt a pull to give to people who haven't had the same opportunities." Michelle adds, "Seeing Charlie's passion only deepens my own desire to give back."

Their connection to SVMOW began through Charlie's work with Vizient, whose employees volunteered on a delivery route. Through that experience — and through getting to know Sister SAM — the Kirkpatricks became part of the SVMOW family. "Her determination, humor, and love for the seniors she served were contagious," Charlie recalls.

"Having food is a basic right," he says. "St. Vincent Meals on Wheels fills that gap for clients who might otherwise go without." Michelle adds, "What moves us most is the appreciation we see from the seniors — you can feel what these meals mean to them."

bonds with clients. "They still talk about those experiences today," Michelle says.

Charlie considers being asked to serve as a pallbearer at one of Sister SAM's services one of the great honors of his life. Another unforgettable moment came when his company's CEO joined a delivery route, met Sister SAM, and was so inspired that he wrote a \$25,000 check to buy a new delivery van. "That moment showed how powerful her spirit — and this mission — truly is."

When asked what they've gained from their involvement, both answer without hesitation: "We absolutely get as much as we give — and so much more."



Looking ahead, they're filled with hope. "We have tremendous faith in Veronica's leadership and in the dedication of the Sisters and staff," Charlie says. "With their commitment, the future of St. Vincent Meals on Wheels — and the homebound seniors it serves — is bright."
